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PREFACE

When the first volume of the Dodge Family was published in 1894, it did not seem at all likely that so much additional material could be readily collected, or that I should be inclined to pursue the work for four additional years. Feeling inclined to visit New England in 1895 for another purpose, I improved the opportunity to examine public records of Vermont and New Hampshire, including many deeds in Washington county, VT., in Sullivan and Cheshire and Rockingham counties, NH., and the probate records in the same counties. By attending the Dodge Reunion at Worcester in 1896, some further researches of the same kind were made, and they showed the need of further and still more comprehensive examination of public records in northeastern Ohio, central, NY., and some counties in New England, hence in 1897 I made further researches in records of deeds and of estates in the following counties: in Lake and Ashtabula counties, Ohio; in Genesee, Ontario, Cayuga, Onondaga, Oneida, Herkimer, Fulton, Montgomery, Saratoga, Rensselaer and Albany counties, NY.; in Berkshire, Hampden, Hampshire, Franklin, Worcester and Middlesex counties in Massachusetts; and in Cheshisre and Rockingham counties in New Hampshire.

I have also copied from the Revolutionary Pension Rolls of the United States, the Dodge pensioners; from the archives of Massachusetts and New Hampshire, the record of the Revolutionary services of the Dodges, and their services in the colonial wars so far as they are accessible. This enables me to present in tabular form:

- I. The roll of Dodge pensioners for Revolutionary services.
- II. The long roll of Dodges who served in the Revolutionary war.
- III. The roll of Dodges who served in the colonial wars, and in a large majority of cases to affix the appropriate number to identify the individual.

This large addition of new material has required several months' labor to properly digest it, and has increased the size of the Second Part much beyond the original design. It has greatly increased its value and exhibits the record of the Dodges as one of the most creditable for their patriotic and other public services.

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REPORT

Of a Reunion held at Worcester, Mass., in pursuance of the following circular: DODGE REUNION

Since the reunion at Salem, Mass., in 1879, it has been discovered that the Dodge Family in the United States consists of at least two main branches, the earlier and larger one having descended from the brothers, William and Richard, who settled in what is now Beverly, Mass., in 1629 and 1638, and the smaller one from Tristram Dodge who settled on Block Island in 1661. The relationship between the two branches remains to be discovered.

The genealogy of the Dodge Family of Essex county, Mass., having been traced out quite fully in its earlier generations, so that a large number of the descendants have the means of knowing their exact relationship to a great number of others, it has been proposed that all who bear our name or are connected with us by ties of kindred, and are interested in our large and influential family should meet together in Horticultural Hall, Worcester, Mass., Wednesday, September 23rd, 1896, at 10 a.m., for a social reunion, to increase our personal acquaintance, to listen to such addresses and papers as may be prepared for the occasion and to enlarge and perfect the history of the family which has been so well begun.

An excursion to Beverly and Wenham on the 24^{th} , or other diversion for social intercourse, as different groups may wish, may be arranged at the reunion.

The undersigned, believing that such a reunion would be an occasion of great interest, would cordially invite all who favor the above proposal to co-operate with us in the effort to bring together a large and worthy assembly of the representatives of one of the earliest families of New England.

Please notify all others within your knowledge who are likely to be interested in the proposed reunion and endeavor to prepare in writing whatever facts of family history may properly be published in connection with a memorial of the meeting. It will much contribute to the success of the meeting

The exercises were to have begun at 10:30 a.m., but the social attractions seemed to be so strong that the members tarried in the library room until 11 o'clock before entering the main hall, when Hon. Rufus B. Dodge, Jr., called the meeting to order and invited Rev. John E. Dodge of Lake View church, Worcester, to offer prayer. The following record of proceedings is taken from the reports given by the Daily Spy, Daily Gazette and Daily Telegram, which kindly published quite full details of the meeting: HON. RUFUS B. Dodge, Jr., in his address of welcome, said that the first reunion of the Dodge family was held in 1879, and then mentioned how carefully the ancestral records had been prepared. The period of modern family associations was begun about this time and here originated the genealogy of the Dodge family, later compiled by Joseph T. Dodge of Madison, Wis. To clear up some of the obscurities of the family records is the object of this reunion. The Dodge family is the best family, and should therefore meet in the best city in the country. Mr. Dodge then spoke of the attractions of the city of Worcester. The family can claim from the fighting Peter Dodge a great degree of loyalty, and an honest and honorable ancestry. He hoped that the future Dodges would maintain the same good relations as the present family. He welcomed all the visitors as members of one great family.

Mr. Dodge then introduced to the meeting JOSEPH T. DODGE of Madison, Wis., the compiler of the Genealogy of the Dodge Family, whom he called upon to preside. Being thus called unexpectedly, the historian of the family in accepting the duty stated "that he was deeply sensible of the honor to which he was called as chairman on this pleasant occasion. He would have much preferred that some man of national reputation should have filled this position but he would do the best he could. In our efforts to arrange for a chairman we have been met by excessive modesty, hence I suppose our friend thought

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best to cut the Gordian knot by springing this surprise so undesirable to myself.

"Having invited your attention to our family history by means of a book of 450 pages, it is scarcely to be supposed that I can add in the brief space of a few minutes any appreciable amount to the detailed information contained in that book. There are probably many here who were at our Salem meeting in 1879. There is this difference in the two occasions. Those who assembled there had little more than the name of Dodge as a bond of union. Today, however, most of those present know exactly their line of descent from their English ancestors, and consequently how nearly or remotely they are related to one another.

"In studying the history of the family, I find a few general facts, which are not contained in my book. I find that the Dodges were all farmers for three generations; in the fourth generation they were more or less

mechanics; in the fifth and sixth there were a few preachers and many mechanics; in the seventh, eighth and ninth, many physicians, mechanics tradesmen, and preachers. For moral character, the Dodge family is above the average. There were many abolitionists; a few prohibitionists, and the family is conspicuous for its practical sense. As to wealth, the family is neither in poverty nor riches."

Benjamin J. Dodge of Worcester spoke a few words upon the Dodge coat of arms that occupied a conspicuous place in the rear of the platform. In addition to the coat of arms there appears to have been a banner borne by Peter Dodge of Podenhughe and barony of Coldingham in the last battles fought by Edward I. of England in 1306-7, a representation of which was shown in the decorations of the house of Thomas H. Dodge on the occasion of the dedication of the Odd Fellows' home here.

Reuben R. Dodge of Wilkinsonville, who was instrumental in projecting the history of the Rawson family, also the history of Sutton, and who for over 50 years has been engaged in collecting material for the Dodge family, was one of the committee to call this meeting. He projected the Dodge meeting in Salem in 1879, when many distinguished members of that family were present. He has assisted Joseph T. Dodge to prepare his work on the family history. R. R. Dodge told of his love for the Dodge family and related how he searched the records to find the history of the Doge family.

Charles Levi Woodbury of Boston, who was to speak, was unavoidably detained.

Martin Dodge of Cleveland, a member of the legislature of Page 456

Ohio, said that he came here to learn of his ancestry, not to talk. He looked upon this place as being the fountainhead of the family. He then gave a sketch of his family tree. His mother was a Canfield, and that family had held annual meetings in Oneida County, New York, for 17 years. He heartily believed in family reunions.

Rufus B. Dodge, Sr., of Charlton, spoke a few words expressing his deep interest in the family gathering. He said that while the Dodges he had known were not as a rule, wealthy, they were active and industrious, and none as far as he knew had ever been in the poorhouse.

Thomas H. Dodge of this city, who has done so much to assist in a financial way the preparation of the Dodge Genealogy, being called on, spoke a few words in regard to the family. He said they were dignified and feel the responsibility they bear. The family is not inclined to frivolity; they look at things in a true light. The parents extend every opportunity to give their children the best that they can to prepare them to take up the burdens of life. The family is marked by a strong character. Consideration for others is another characteristic. This is an important point in the character of man or woman. They are industrious, and you will find when a member is blessed with means he has a fellow feeling for those about them. These traits are among those on which a true government rests.

Hon. E. P. Dodge, late mayor of Newburyport, who has been in the shoe business for 29 years, spoke a few words, in which he expressed his pleasure at being present. He heartily approved of the idea of issuing a *second part* of the Dodge family book.

The meeting adjourned for the afternoon at 12:45. Dinner was served in the upper hall.

Immediately after the dinner was over a company of over sixty persons assembled in front of the First Universalist church and had a group picture taken which will be a souvenir of special value to all who were there present.

At the opening of the afternoon session, Joseph T. Dodge said that, inasmuch as many persons had signified their interest in Beverly, which was the home of William and Richard Dodge, he suggested that a visit be made to that historic town, where the Dodge mansion might be seen. He desired that a party leave Boston for Salem at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning, and thence to Beverly. Nine persons signified their intention of going, and the number was considerably increased later.

Cyrus Asa Dodge of Syracuse, NY., emphasized the necessity Page 457

for more work and more research in compiling the *second part* of the family record.

Ezra Dodge Hines of Salem spoke of the great value of such gatherings, and gave a short sketch of Richard Dodge.

He was a quiet man and had strong religious tendencies, and, on coming to this country, united with the church at Beverly. He was deeply interested in education, and was one of the greatest contributors of his town to Harvard College. William, his brother, was of a strong character.

Dr. John W. Dodge of Pittsburg, PA., said his purpose in coming here was for sociability. He came to learn, rather than to communicate. He said that he had lost the link of his ancestry and he had come here to find it.

Samuel R. Dodge of Worcester, who said he was a descendant of the Block Island people, said a traveling man from Maine had lately called on him and asked if he could trace the Dodge family back. The man's mother was anxious to learn some early history.

"I told him I could trace the Dodge family back to Noah, and I can. The family can be traced through the Abraham family, through the Hebrews and on down through all these centuries. My ancestors in this country settled on Block Island some time previous to 1660. We have been isolated on Block Island, but have intermarried and inbred so much that I claim to be pretty much a pure Dodge." (Laughter and applause.)

James Hale Dodge, city auditor of Boston, spoke of the value of securing the names of Dodges who served in the Revolution.

Interesting remarks were also made by Henry M. Dodge of Post Mills, VT.; Chester W. Dodge of Rutland, Mass.; Cyrus M. Dodge of Manchester, Mass.; Mrs. Sarah Dodge Jones of Keene, NH., and others.

Reference to the death of Miss Mary Abigail Dodge (Gail Hamilton) was made by the chairman and attention was called to the article in regard to Miss Dodge in Harper's Bazaar of Aug. 29, 1896.

The election of officers completed the day's work, and resulted as follows: President, Joseph T. Dodge of Madison, Wis.; vice president, R. B. Dodge, Jr., of Worcester; secretary and treasurer, Ezra Dodge Hines of Danvers, Mass.

It was voted to have a secretary in every state of the union as far as possible and to do everything to build up the organization. The officers will select an executive committee and fixed dues will be decided upon.

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The state secretaries as far as selected are as follows: Henry Dodge of Manchester; H. M. Dodge of Post Mills, VT.; Chester W. Dodge of Rutland, Mass.; Dr. J. S. Dodge of Pittsburg, PA.; Cyrus Dodge of Syracuse, NY., Hon. Martin Dodge of Cleveland, Ohio; Benjamin W. Dodge of New York City.

INTRODUCTION

THE INHERITED RIGHT TO BEAR COAT ARMOR IN AMERICA.

"Most conclusive of all the mass of proof of the American right to use coat armor is set forth in these words of Washington: 'It is far from my design to intimate any opinion that heraldry, Coat-armor, &c., might not be rendered conducive to public and private use with us, or that they can have any tendency unfriendly to the purest spirit of republicanism. On the contrary, a different conclusion is deducible from the practice of Congress and the states, all of which have established some kind of Armorial devices to authenticate their official instruments.' __ Maxims of George Washington &c. J. F. Shroeder, D. D., p. 22.

"Many seals are now in possession of descendants, and give substantial proof of the inheritance of coat-armor. The Colonial governors all used arms, as shown by the seals of Sir Wm. Phipps and many others, of which copies are extant.

"General Washington had two seal forms as well as the book plate. Heraldry, though applied to coatarmor, is in truth a term for the work of the herald, and is much more than blazoning and marshalling armes. The coat-of-armes is literally a dignified trade mark, in the genealogical sense, or badge of the name and family to which it pretends. It is useful for the identification of persons and property, and is more to be relied on in research than the family names, which, by reason of variations in spelling in old records, etc., are difficult to follow, while the accuracy of a coat-of armes can always be relied on. It shows connection, descent and important marriages—being the most useful guide to historians, genealogists and pedigree compilers. It began seven hundred years ago as an aid to the identification of persons, and today it exists exactly in the same sense. The use of heraldic bearings is not indicative of rank or title. It is, and always has been, the distinction of a house, whether commoners,

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gentles or nobles. In all countries this is true to day, and in them all men, if gentlemen—as we in American understand the term—are entitled to this name distinction, for legal as well as social purposes. This is equally true of the helmet, crest, mantle, or flourish and motto.

"In this country we preach that all men are equal, and long before that doctrine was accepted politically, coat-armor made all men above servants equal. There is absolutely no class or distinction in heraldic bearing, all coat-armor is complete, finished and equal, one shield to another, the armes of a king are no more, no less, and no better than those of the poorest commoner in the kingdom.

"In the English roll of armes today there are some sixty six thousand blazonings. Of these less than three thousand are in the peerage and baronetage, the others are in the gentry or people of England.

"Again, we find coat-armor in the earliest times was closely connected with the bearing of surnames, the one begetting the other. Not until after the 13th century were surnames established, and almost, if not quite at the same time, heraldry became a regulated usage. So armes and surnames in Europe have been synonymous for centuries. For a man without armor—that is, not bearing coat-armor—it was unnecessary to have a surname, as he was either a vassal, servitor, retainer or peasant. When he had gained or assumed a surname the possession of coat-armor soon followed. As to the right of inheriting a name that is so established as to be understood and never disputed. A grant of coat-armor indicates an attachment to name, and implies that it is a hereditament—never going with a title or estate, but strictly and solely with the name to the immediate heir. As we accepted the right of inheriting family names, and through usage the right to bear armes jointly, naturally it follow that the right still exists, only ending when all branches of the house are extinct. In fact the right cannot be vacated by disuse on the part of a family in the line of descent, as is often the case, and any generation after, first establishing the right by connecting the lineage thus broken, can

claim and bear the coat-of-armes." The above is somewhat abridged from Mortimer Delano, Pursuivant of Armes, In VOGUE.

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THE DODGE ARMS

Very slight attention was given to this subject in the first volume because in my republican simplicity I had never thought it of much consequence, but it has so often been pressed upon my attention during my studies for the present volume that I am sure the Dodge Family will be gratified by the following information, for which I am indebted to the enterprise of Captain Charles Dodge, No. 873-ii, pp. 215, 406.

From Rev. S. Baring Gould to Charles Dodge, Jr.

Lew Trenchard, N. Devon, Eng., 9 May, 1895.

Dear Sir:--The Doidge family of this county came from Milton Abbott near (5 ms. n. w. of) Tavistock (on river Tavy, 16 ½ ms. N. of Plymouth) where they were tenants of the abbots of Tavistock in Henry VII's reign (1485-1509), they occupied a fine old house, Coombe, not their own but subject to the Duke of Bedford. They got reduced at the beginning of this century & were dispersed. The ante-penultimate Duke pulled Coombe down. Somewhere about 1750-80 this (Duke) had Hurlditch in Larneston (parish), and the shield in the arms in plaster was over the doorway. Hurlditch has been rebuilt but the present owner, R. Mushead, Esq., has the original plaster cast. The arms are the same as those you describe.

The representative of the Doidges now is a surgeon, Mr. Maurice Doidge, who has I believe some mementos of the family, old plate &c, but he does not know anything of the pedigree. He was at Lifton (4 ms. E. of Launceston) but has left. His address now is Elmhurst, Haverhill, Suffolk.

There are a number of Doidges, farmers & laborers in this neighborhood. Farmers of this name still in Milton Abbott. The name hereabout is spelled Doidge, but pronounced Dodge.

There is a Maurice Doidge in Larneston p'sh, N. Tavistock yeoman, owner of Woodley which has been in the Doidge possession for some centuries.

Elmhurst, Haverhill, Suffolk, England July 21, 1895.

My dear Sir:--I must ask your pardon for my delay in answering your letter. I have been much from home of late and my time has been fully occupied. I am much interested to hear of an American branch of the family, for such no doubt yours is.

I fear that my information as to the family is very meager. I have never had time to thoroughly investigate the subject: certainly I claim the right to the use of the arms. The Devonshire Doidges have always used them for the past two centuries and I have believed ours to be really the only direct line of Doidges left, for the name is very rare in England—the other form of it—Dodge—your form is much more common in the States, I fancy than in England. You will see from the slip I enclose (which I use for pasting inside any books I value) what the arms are. You will also see from the head of this sheet of paper that we—I mean many generations past—have been in the habit of using the crest, as is the custom in this country. I do not think the crest is quite correctly described in the account you quote of it in Mr. Tupper's letter; it should be called a "demi-sea dog" not "sea-lion", so I have always been told. I have records of the Doidges being seated at Milton Abbot, near Tavistock in West Devon for more than two centuries past; really they have been in that neighborhood it is almost certain for over three centuries if not four; but I have no precise date earlier than 1655. From this you will see that I cannot ell you anything of William of Somersetshire who was the founder

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of the American branch. But in all the old county histories of Devon, and Cornwall also, (parish of Stoke, Clairsland) there are notes of a gentle family of this name residing in West Devon for centuries past. At one time they held considerable properties in that part of the county of Devon. I have a photograph of the manor-house of Hurlditch in the parish of Larneston, near Tavistock, with the arms of Doidge over the chief entrance; this place belonged to the family in the early part of the lat century and has been pulled down to be rebuilt within the last few years. The present owner who has built the new house, sent me the photo of the old one. There was also Coombe House, in Milton Abbot, Devon, which I saw once, and which was pulled down about 30 years ago. This was a fine old house and, with an estate round it, had belonged to the Doidges till sold to the Duke of Beford on the death of Maurice Doidge, my grandfather's grand uncle; the house had stood and belonged to the Doidges (according to Mr. Baring Gould) since Elizabeth's time.

How the family got into Devonshire I do not know, but certainly they spring from the Cheshire family, the founder of which was Peter Doidge of Stopworth to whom Edward I granted the arms we now bear in the year 1273 (April 8 is the exact date of the grant, not 1305).

I have never heard the connection of the Devon branch with the original family of Cheshire traced; but it is the same family, and evidently from the arms the Norfolk and Kent families were also descendants of the Cheshire stock. These two branches in Norfolk and Kent appear to be extinct. Doubtless the Somersetshire family from whom you trace descent had emigrated from the adjoining county of Devon—I do not know that any Doidges are now found in Somerset. Do you happen to know in what parish of that county the death of John Doidge, the father of William of Salem, is registered? If so I should much like to know.

I have a few bits of old plate in my possession, but none dating back to the date of the emigration to America. I have two fine old silver tankards, one bearing date 1707 and the initials H. D.; another of almost exactly the same date (as the marks show) bearing the arms of Doidge; a smaller one bearing the date 1720, and also a few old spoons bearing either crest or initials, the oldest of which is 16--. I have also in my possession the official seal of Richard Doidge who was High Sheriff of Devon in 1771 (an office of great dignity in England). I do not know if a photo, of any of these things would interest you as you ask me for photo-

graphs of family possessions; if so, of course it will give me pleasure to obtain one and send to you. I wish it was in my power to tell you more of the Cheshire Doidges from whom we both spring. I have often thought of going into Cheshire to endeavor to trace the family, but have never had the time to spare for what is a long and troublesome search. But if the small amount of information I have been able to give you is of the slightest interest to you I am very glad to have been able to do it. Believe me to be

My dear Sir:--I greatly regret leaving your last letter so long unanswered, but my time has been very fully occupied. I have been compelled to shift my quarters from the county of Suffolk to this place, thus returning once more to the West of England. I find that Chinnock, of which you speak, is not very far distant from Glastonbury and I hope one day to be able to go there and perhaps I may collect any interesting item of news relative to your branch of the family' if so I will not fail to communicate them to you. I find that the name Dodge is till known in this immediate neighborhood, so that evidently it has lingered in this part of Somerset since the emigration of William in the 17th century. I can only answer your question as to the spelling of the name by telling you that so far as I know it has always been spelt in that way by the West Devon branch: in some old county histories & books of that sort dating some centuries back you will find the family mentioned as that of "Doidge or Dodge".

The translation of the motto "Leni perfruar otio" is "let me enjoy gentle ease". So many of the family have acted thoroughly on the motto that the last few generations have not enjoyed any of the ease due to the possession of property as it has long ago disappeared.

St. Badeauz, the place in Devonshire which you mention, is not far distant from Tavistock, both being in the western part of the county,--so no doubt can exist of the Devonshire origin of the Somerset-shire Dodges. The photographs of the silver place represent four silver tankards, the earliest of Queen Anne's time.—the seal is that of Richard Doidge

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who was High Sheriff of Devon in the last century sometime, and the largest of the three tankards also belonged to him and bears on it the arms of Doidge impaled with those of some other family, probably his wife's. These things of course are of no interest to any one else but from the tone of your letter they will, I am sure, possess some interest for you.

I have to thank you very much for the volume you sent me, the pedigree of the American Dodges which is of course of much interest to me. I hope that some day you will be able to carry out your desire to visit the old country, in which case pray remember that Glastonbury is in itself a most interesting town, and that you will not be without a welcome if you pay it a visit. SECOND BEVERLY CHURCH

The remodeled edifice of the North Beverly Congregational Society, which was re-dedicated a few evenings ago, is 184 years old, and is the first and only house of worship the society has ever had. When the society was first organized it was as "a precinct of Salem and Beverly". It was in November, 1713, that the first meeting of the Society was held, and a building committee appointed. The edifice was built and dedicated in 1714. It was originally 50 by 40 feet in size. Fifty-seven years after it was built a porch was

added to the front end by *Caleb Dodge*. The steeple was built in 1751 and in 1753 a bell was presented by Robert Hooper. In 1837 the building was removed to its present site. For many years the ceiling was not plastered, but later in the century some of the wealthy parishioners had spaces over their own pews covered. When Robert Hooper gave the bell to the society he was given a free pew, and it was then that the whole ceiling was plastered.

At the time General Gates was stationed in Danvers, and was residing in the Collins house, he attended services in the old North Beverly Church.
